Kaluwewa model village

Two phases of the Kaluwewa model village renovation project have been completed by the Air Force to mark the 70th anniversary of the Sri Lanka Air Force (SLAF). The Kaluwewa village situated in Halmilla, Kebithigollewa, is home to more than 300 families comprising about 900 people. Under the first phase renovations, the village temple, a playground, main hall and washroom complex for the school were completed. In addition, thirteen houses were built. In the second phase, an office building for the school, a water tank for the village and twelve houses were built. The SLAF Vauvniya base is entrusted with coordinating of all matters relating to these development projects.

Raid in Kalpitiya

The Puttalam fisheries office carried out a raid in Kalpitiya and confiscated illegal fishing nets, which cause destruction to marine resources.

Around 150 of these illegal cage nets were found after the raid on Tuesday. The nets are valued at around five million rupees.

Puttalam fisheries office Deputy Director told that these nets are illegal because young fish also get caught in these nets, and this prevents the growth of certain fish species. He further said that these cage nets are rented out by a group of businessmen in the area, and fishermen lay them in the sea around Kalpitiya. Naval officials from the Kalpitiya Vijaya Navy camp assisted the fisheries officials in the raid.

Ring around the sun

News of a ring around the sun spread faster than light on Thursday. There was a large circle of light resembling a full rainbow around the sun against the backdrop of a clear sky.

It is said that the same conditions can cause "moon rings" often on full moon days but solar halos can be more colourful as the sun is brighter.

According to experts, this is not a rare phenomenon and is more common than a rainbow, but people generally missed it, not tending to look up into a sunny sky.

Although lunar halos or moon rings on a full moon day are gorgeous and people can watch them with bare eyes, people should be cautious if they want to observe a solar halo, the experts cautioned.

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- ① My name is Anu Karunaratne, and I was born in Sri Lanka to a Sinhalese father and Tamil mother. My father, Saman Karunaratne, was a prominent scientist in Sri Lanka, and my mother was Akila Selvadurai. Although she aspired to be a teacher when she was young, later she had developed an interest in science and ended up as a **renowned** scientist. Right now, I am 32 years old and pursuing a career in science.
- ② I am fortunate enough to work on a science project in the USA along with some amazing women scientists developing medicine for critical illnesses. From the design of the medicine to the clinical trial team, nearly two-thirds of the researchers working on this project are women.
- ③ I am happy because I continue my family tradition of science careers. As a child growing up in Sri Lanka, I was lucky to have many female role models to follow. I always wanted to be a doctor, and also loved problem-solving and understanding how things work. That is what led me to develop a career in clinical research. I had girl friends who were discouraged from studying science and mathematics at school as **they** were perceived to be masculine subjects while history and languages were considered to be feminine subjects. Growing up around women with independent careers, it never occurred to me that I could not be a doctor or a scientist because I was a girl.
- ④ The culture of our family was such that working women were always encouraged and appreciated. My husband is also very supportive. He understands when I have to work late. We are equal partners in the house in terms of sharing the childcare and housework. I believe that it is important your family supports you in what you do. I wouldn't have been able to succeed in my work without my family's support.
- ⑤ To me, family, friends, and relaxation are more important than my career. It can be difficult to combine a career with the 'relaxation' and be supported by employers to get this balance right. I believe that equal pay and flexible working patterns are crucial to better support working women.

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- ① Child labour is an increasing problem in Sri Lanka. New laws are introduced to protect under-aged children from potential exploitation. Therefore, an amendment to the labour law of 1956 is introduced to add twenty more occupations to the list of work considered dangerous to children. As a result, Sri Lanka regards fifty-one work areas as dangerous for children.
- ② Those surveys reported important findings. The first finding is that many children were in paid and unpaid jobs, helping parents in cultivation and family businesses. Among them, most children work in paid jobs while a minority is in unpaid and dangerous forms of child labour. The second finding shows that these working children had attended school although they worked. Surprisingly, 80% of working children had attended school in 2008 compared with 39% in 2016. The other survey finding indicates a drop in schooling among working children, and it was due to the long wait for G.C.E. Ordinary Level examination results. During this time, children find jobs and lose interest in further studies.
- ③ In addition, the latest survey results reveal the impact of COVID-19 on children. According to them, the continuous lockdowns imposed in the last two years because of the COVID-19 pandemic have had a devastating impact on some families. As a result, parents of low-income families have turned to their children to earn their family income, pushing children to give up education. Also, the non-accessibility to online classes and lack of data coverage in many parts of rural Sri Lanka have frustrated children who then give up education.
- ④ However, specific legal practices have been imposed in Sri Lanka, and they have led to reducing child labour. There is a particular legal age a child can work according to the law. In January 2021, the legal age a child can work was increased from 14 years to 16 years. This extension has reduced the number of children working. In addition, mandatory education up to year 13 in schools has also contributed to the drop in the number of children working.
- ⑤ Ironically, the year 2021 has been declared as "Eradication of Child Labour" by the United Nations (UN). The UN is a forum of around 200 countries. It strives for a world where 'children work on their dreams and not in the fields.' In compliance with the UN resolution, Sri Lanka has set a national committee to identify and address issues related to child labour in the country.

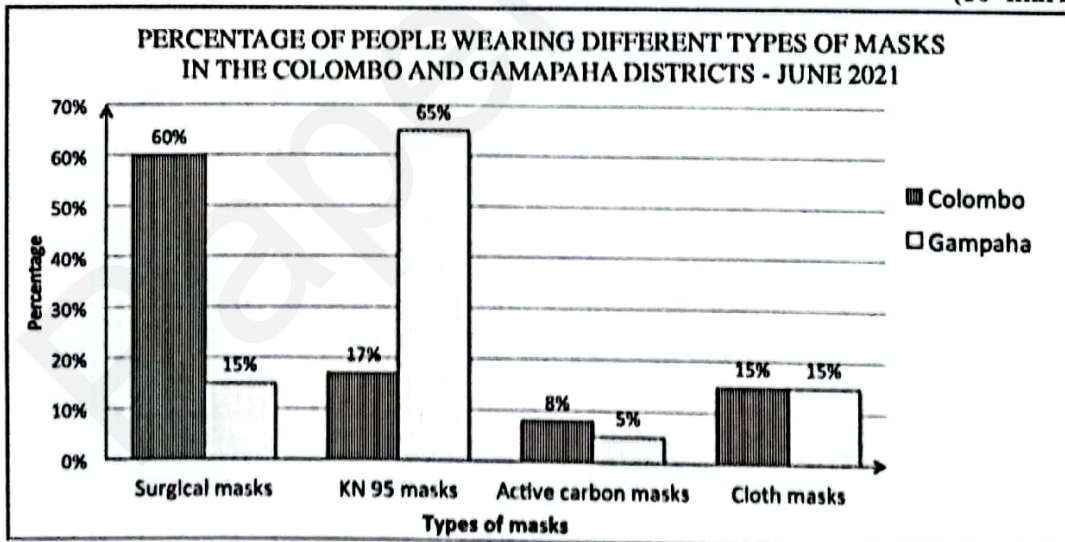
